The University of the Sunshine Coast (USC) located in the state of Queensland is regionally relevant and recognized, nationally and internationally, for excellence in teaching, research and engagement. USC is one of Australia's fastest growing universities, serving the Sunshine Coast and extended region from north Brisbane to the Fraser Coast. The University opened in 1996 with 500 students. Today, with more than 8,000 enrolled students, USC is on track to reach projected student enrolments of 12,000 by 2015. USC has a site at Gympie (effective 2013) and a study support centre at Noosa and a research facility on Fraser Island.

USC has a proud record of achievement in learning and teaching. It is the only Queensland public university to consistently rate five stars for teaching quality, and wins more than its share of national teaching awards. The University has also earned five-star ratings for graduate satisfaction with generic skills gained while at university, and for Indigenous participation. USC offers around 150 undergraduate and post graduate study programs in business and information technology; communication and design; education; health; humanities and social sciences; and science and engineering. Degrees can include elective courses and specializations across a range of disciplines. Entrepreneurship or sustainability can be studied as part of most degree programs. Academic programs are designed with industry to meet regional needs and often include opportunities for work experience, internships and practical industry-based projects.

USC undertakes research of international, national and local significance. Areas of strength include genecology, regional sustainability and health. Recent notable successes have included tuna breeding in captivity (collaborative research), fast-growing tropical hardwoods (collaborative research) and climate change adaptation projects.

The University's location on Queensland's Sunshine Coast offers many lifestyle benefits including beautiful beaches and stunning hinterland, a warm climate, and a relaxed and friendly community. The campus is located 90km north of Brisbane, Queensland's capital. USC's campus at Sippy Downs features modern, distinctive architecture and environmentally sensitive design. It has been recognized with more than 30 awards in planning, architecture and construction. The campus is fully equipped with cafés, an art gallery, award-winning library, bookshop, 24-hour computer laboratories, lecture theatres, and high-tech teaching spaces including science and sports laboratories. The sports precinct includes an international-standard athletics track, an indoor sports stadium with gymnasium, and an Olympic-standard swimming pool. Bordered by Mooloolah River National Park, the University grounds provide sanctuary for native wildlife, including wild kangaroos.

## PRESENTERS FOR THE ALAF MONGOLIA PROGRAM

### Dr Bill Allen: Deputy Director International Projects Group USC



Dr Bill Allen is a Senior Lecturer at USC. He is the Deputy Director of the International Projects Group. Dr Allen has worked in teacher education particularly in the areas of senior curriculum, and in post-graduate coursework programs specializing in curriculum, action research and assessment. Mr Atwell speaks Indonesian and has an Ass.Diploma in Business Management from TAFE, a Bachelor of International Business from Griffith University, a Diploma in Export Management from the Australian Institute of Export, a Graduate Diploma in Development Studies and a Masters in Community and International Development from Deakin University.

### Professor John Bartlett: Executive Dean, Faculty of Science, Health, Education and Engineering USC



Professor Bartlett joined the University of the Sunshine Coast in 2012 and has over 25 years experience in synthesis and characterisation of nanomaterials and nanoscale systems. His interests include the development of chemical strategies for producing self assembling organic/inorganic nanohybrids based on silica and titania sol gel chemistry, where organic groups capable of forming supramolecular architectures by exploiting well defined interactions such as steric effects, H bonding, pi-pi interactions and hydrophobic/hydrophilic interactions are used to control the structural evolution of the nanohybrids. As the newly appointed Executive Dean, Professor Bartlett aims to enhance the Faculty's tradition of innovative teaching and research through a platform of engagement and research excellence, depth and intensity in strategic areas.

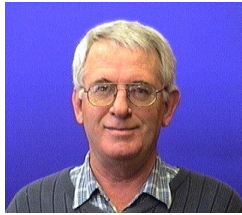
## **Professor Robert Elliot: Pro Vice-Chancellor (International and Quality) USC**

## Emeritus Professor Bob Elson



Emeritus Professor Bob Elson undertook five years of theological study before enrolling at Monash University in Arts in 1970 where he completed a combined Honours degree in History and Politics with first-class honours in 1973. He tutored in the Departments of History and Politics at Monash in 1974 while he learned Dutch and Indonesian. Professor Elson began doctoral study in the Department of History in 1975, having won a Commonwealth Postgraduate Scholarship, a Netherlands Government Scholarship and a Myer Foundation Grant. He was then appointed as Senior Teaching Fellow in the School of Modern Asian Studies (later School of International Business and Asian Studies) at Griffith University. He was Dean, Faculty of Asian and International Studies, Griffith University, 1994-96; Director, Griffith Asia Pacific Council, 1997-2001; Director, Griffith Asia Pacific Research Institute, 2001-2003 before being appointed Professor of Southeast Asian History, The University of Queensland, in 2003 until his retirement in 2010. He is currently a member, Academic Commission (Wetenschapscommissie), Netherlands Institute for War Documentation (2004-). Professor Elson's other research interests include Indonesian political thinking, leadership in Indonesia; changing identity in Indonesia; the social and economic history of Southeast Asia; social and economic change in nineteenth and twentieth century Java; colonialism and its impact in Southeast Asia, especially in Indonesia; the economic history of peasant production in Southeast Asia, 1800-1990.

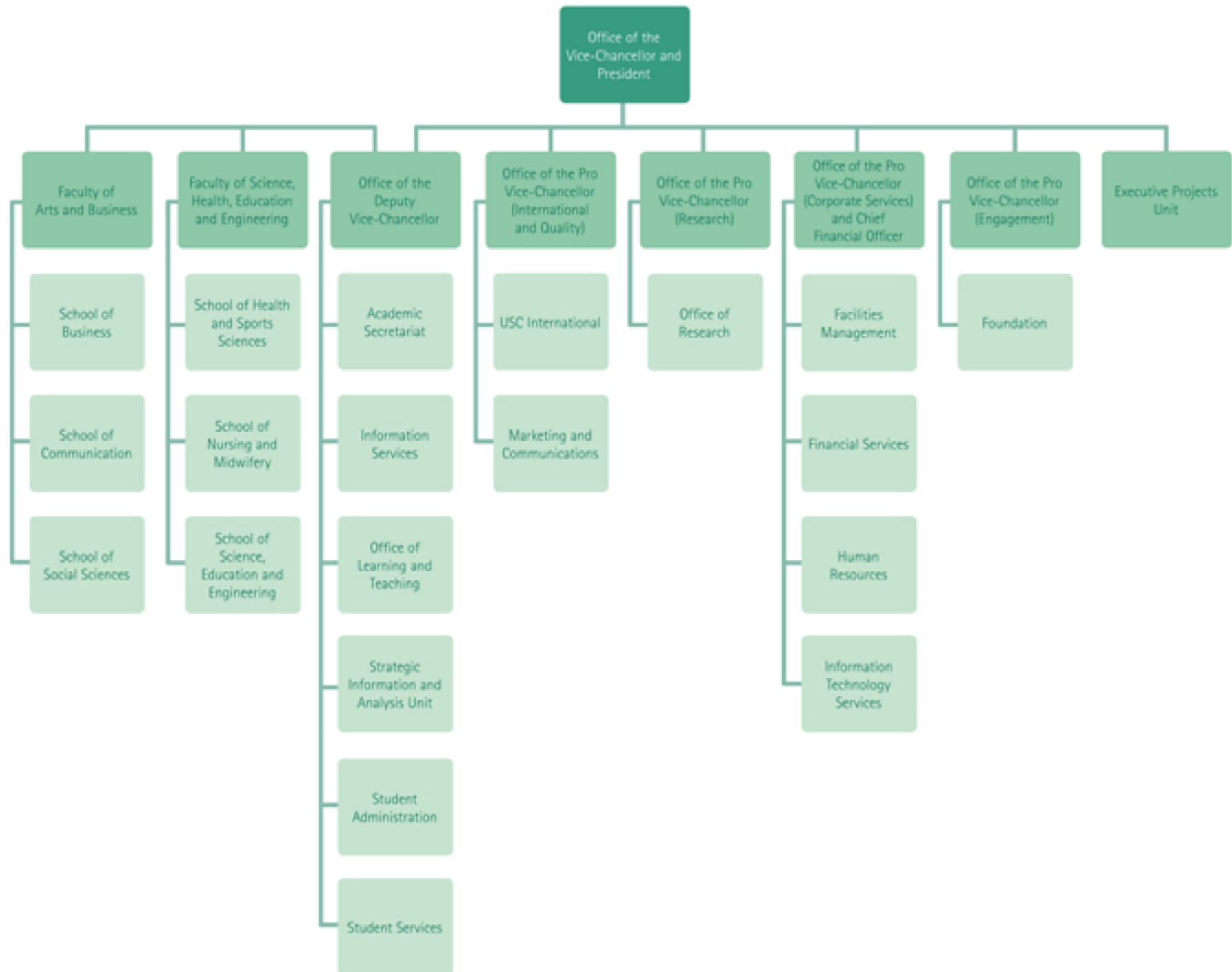
